

Last week, the ministry team attended a conference on Church Growth. It was good to be reminded of our mandate to *make mature disciples in ever increasing number*. This is and should be our focus. As Jesus issues this mandate (Matthew 28:18-20), 'all' is a recurring phrase: *all* authority, *all* nations, *all* things (NIV = everything) & *all* the days (NIV = always).

ALL AUTHORITY belongs to Jesus. His resurrection identifies Him as the One through whom God's authority is mediated (Acts 17). Jesus humbled Himself, coming in flesh and in dying on a cross ... but God exalted Him, raising Him from the dead and placing Him at His right hand. In doing so, God declares Jesus is the One before whom every knee shall bow – *He is Lord*. This is not dependent on you recognising it or not; nor on your perception or preference ... He died, rose, and is exalted – all authority is His! You will experience His authority, one way or another – either by submitting to His lordship willingly now or incurring His judgement later.

His central instruction in the great commission is to make disciples – going, baptising and teaching are secondary to making disciples. That's what we must do ... but we must do it everywhere: ALL NATIONS! Wherever we go, wherever we are; we are to be intentional and passionate about making disciples. Not only far away, but right here at home too – with our family, our neighbours, and our colleagues; always working towards their salvation. Some will go further because we're concerned for all nations without distinction or favouritism; but this is never to the exclusion of the lost on our doorstep. "When the preferences of the church members are greater than their passion for [making disciples], the church is dying" (Tom Rainer).

Part of making disciples is to teach them to obey EVERYTHING (ALL THINGS) Jesus commanded. As we've seen in our recent sermon series, this is about more than laws being blindly obeyed; it's about kingdom ethics shaping our character and conduct ... with teachings that are never outdated, outmoded or superseded. We can't be selective about His teaching ... ALL means everything! This is why some don't want to be disciples — not because they don't want salvation but because they don't want to obey everything! True discipleship is always about life-transforming obedience to Jesus. But we cannot obey if we don't know. Hence, discipleship is also marked by a hunger and a thirst for the Word of God. The more we know, the more we will obey ... and want to obey!

All of which, we are mindful that Jesus is with us ALWAYS (ALL THE DAYS). We don't grow in obedience or make disciples in our own strength! The One who holds all authority will be with us ... the whole of every day until the last day. From the beginning to the end, there is never a time when Jesus isn't with His people. Matthew's gospel starts with the arrival of Jesus – *God with us*. And ends with the wonderful assurance – *God still with us!* This is our great assurance, even on those days we don't feel it, and a truth we must cling to – God's presence with us always!

It's when we remember these ALL's of the great commission that we will strive to make mature disciples in ever increasing number by daily loving God, loving people and loving the Bible. I hope and pray that you will continue to walk this journey with us.

NEWS From Our Mission Partner: Michele Roux

Dear Friends,

There are so many kinds of seasons that we encounter: changing weather, different times that mark the year like school calendars, kaleidoscopic feelings, seasons for ministry and many more. There have been many seasons for me to reflect on over the past few months.

Unfamiliar Seasons

Even after having been in Thailand for a year, I still haven't been able to get used to the normal rhythms of life here. It still feels out of sync with what's 'my normal'. I miss the routine of an academic year starting and ending with a calendar year, with a distinct winter and summer in June and December respectively. As I live in different seasons, there's a feeling of being unsettled and longing for what I'm used to. As I write, we are well into the smoky season, waiting for the rainy season to start and clear the pollution that's been accumulating. We still have a few months to wait though. Smokey season is gloomy and doing things outdoors becomes less and less pleasant. Even after a short ride on my scooter my throat burns, and my chest is tight. Besides being smoky season, it is also the Thai New Year this weekend, known as Songkran. Songkran is a three-day festival that marks the start of the traditional Thai New Year and is celebrated with water fights in the streets. The water fights are an escalation of a traditional water pouring ceremony where scented water is poured onto Buddha statues at temples, which symbolically represents purification or the washing away of the previous year to welcome in the New Year. The university academic year ended in March, so many students have already travelled home to visit their families for the long break before the new academic year in June. Although, some try to squash in a quick visit home and then return to Chiang Mai so they can be part of the water fights in the bigger city. It's weird celebrating the end of an academic year and a new year at this time of year. Even as strange as the timing of these seasons are, I've come to enjoy the changing of seasons, no matter what form they take because seasons have come to remind me of God's continued faithfulness. Seasons remind me of growth, and the new opportunities that God brings. So, I'm learning to embrace these new seasons, to appreciate their uniqueness and not grumble for what they're not. But even more so, to love the people for whom the seasons I'm living in are not strange.

Joyful Seasons

Loneliness has been a season I've struggled with here in a way that I have not experienced in a long time. It was such a joy therefore to receive my mom and Abi for a week's visit at the end of March. I enjoyed sharing my life here with them, and seeing things through the eyes of a child made me appreciate the excitement and wonder of a new city again. It was a whirlwind visit, but it was lovely to chat, drink tea, tell jokes, and enjoy the tradition of a "Friday movie cinema" (even if it wasn't on a Friday, the heart of it was there). Of course, we did the two most touristy things there are to be done in Thailand: we visited elephants and rode in a tuktuk. Abi also loved her introduction to scooter life, and visits to 7-11 of all places. I am so grateful for this season we had together, even if it was very short, because it refreshed my soul and helped me to keep plodding on. As my mom and Abi left, I started planning for the rest of the year, and for other new seasons that are to come.

Changing Seasons

Knowing now that I'll be staying in Thailand longer-term means that it would be wise to spend some time focusing on Thai language study. I will still be connected to The Centre once I start language study. While I will not teach classes, it will serve as a support network and a place where I can serve by maintaining relationships I have built so far and continuing to help with events and running Bible studies. I do not know what ministry will look like beyond language study, but I'm excited about this next step and being able to focus on language learning. Please pray with me over the next few months as changes are made, especially for the visa changes as these are an increasingly difficult issue to negotiate. With these changes there are extra financial needs and many, many details that are still unknown. I have had to remember that: "waiting on God requires the willingness to bear uncertainty, to carry within oneself the unanswered question, lifting the heart to God about it whenever it intrudes upon one's thoughts" (Elizabeth Elliot). It is a great comfort to know that God knows how all the details of the next season will unfold, and that I can trust Him with those details. Thank you for your support both through prayer and financially in the journey this far. I count it a privilege to keep you updated as different seasons ebb and flow. With love in Christ, Michéle
